

“Time For Growth” by Pastor Barrett Ingram

Points of Interest from the Session Meeting

The statement, “We are an increasingly impatient society,” is hardly a profound observation. After all, we invented fast food and a host of other “instant” food options. There are also any number of new timesaving devices, all purporting to outperform whatever they are replacing. We periodically hear about incidences of road rage, mostly born of impatience. And with the nearly ubiquitous smart phone, users have at their fingertips an endless array of stimuli, making instant gratification a regular reality. Most of us are “so busy” being busy that we are looking for any and every shortcut to help us complete whatever tasks might need our immediate attention.



An incident reported from over a century and a half ago would suggest that impatience is nothing new in our culture. Before his foray into politics, James A. Garfield served a brief stint as president of Hiram College in Ohio. A man approached Garfield with a request that his son be admitted for a “shorter course” because, he said, “The boy can never take all that in. He wants to get through quicker. Can you arrange it for him?” Garfield, who was both a preacher and an educator, replied: “Oh yes. He can take a short course; it all depends on what you want to make of him. When God wants to make an oak, He takes a hundred years, but He takes only two months to make a squash.”

In the path of our spiritual development, it would be nice if we could find a few shortcuts. If only there were

some pre-packaged, all-in-one, easy ways to walk with the Lord and grow as disciples. Regrettably, it doesn’t work that way. There are no short courses, no gimmicks. It takes time to grow. Growth is a sequence – an orderly arrangement. “...first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head,” as Jesus puts it, using an agricultural metaphor in one of his parables (Mark 4:28). There are steps to go through before a seed can mature into a plant capable of producing seed-bearing fruit, and this maturation process takes time.

Many years ago, I served as the youth representative for my home church’s committee that was responsible for producing a new mission statement. During the course of our meetings, our executive presbyter met with us one evening. All these years later, I still remember something he said: “The overall health of the local church is largely determined by the spiritual health of the individual members.” It makes sense, if you stop and think about it. We are all parts of a body (the Body of Christ), and when one part of the body is not doing well, it has ramifications for the body as a whole. The implication is that all members have a function as part of the whole, and it is important for all parts to be as spiritually healthy as possible.

As we think about moving into the future with the opportunities that God has given BPC, it might be helpful for

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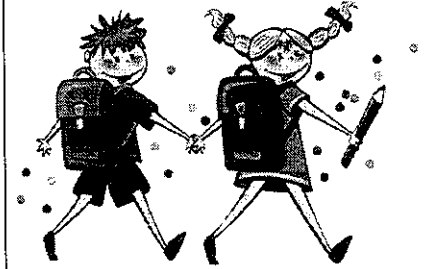

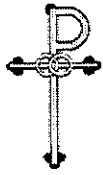
**Adult and Youth Classes**



“South Louisiana Summer is Not for the Faint of Heart” - by Mariano Hinojosa

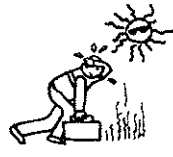

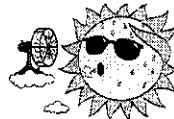
It would take a tent over the whole city starting in May and lasting until about November.

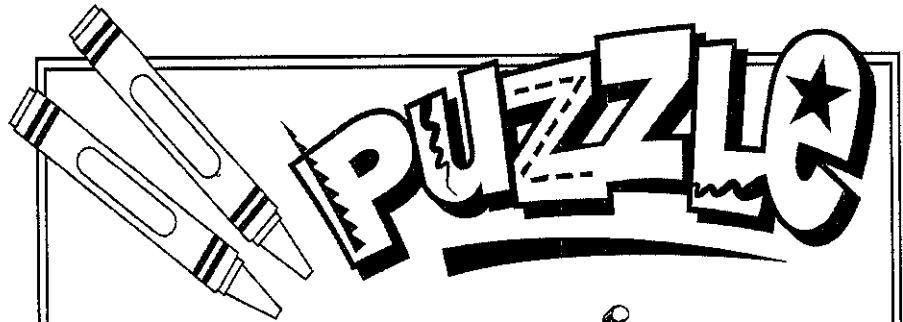
Make these yummy treats as a summer snack.

What you do:

1. In a bowl, mix peanut butter, oats, honey and instant milk powder into dough. If too dry, add more peanut butter or honey.
2. Roll dough into 20 long balls. Place them on a cookie sheet and refrigerate.
3. Melt the dark chocolate chips and place them in a zippered baggie. Cut a tiny bit off one corner.
4. Remove dough from refrigerator. Squeeze thin lines of chocolate as stripes onto the bee bodies.
5. Use two mini chocolate chips for eyes, a slivered almond for a stinger and two sliced almonds as wings. Enjoy!

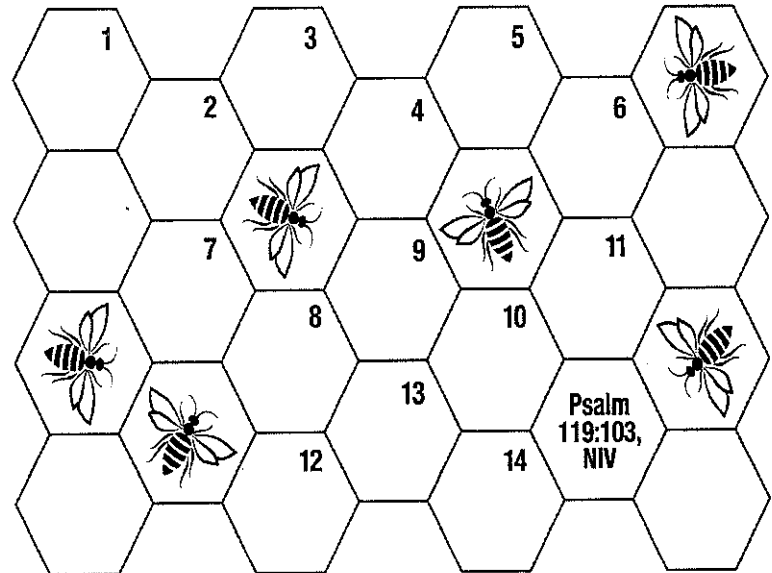
