



“In The Interim” by Joe Reggin

As I write this, I’m beginning my third week at Broadmoor Presbyterian Church. As of the first of August, I am officially on your pay role and have, almost, gotten settled. I say almost because I still have to get a Louisiana driver’s license and I still have some books to unpack. I have enjoyed and appreciated these first two weeks with you and want to thank you all for the warm welcome you have extended to me. I want to especially thank those who attended the adult study during VBS. Your welcome and fellowship in those first few days was a great blessing to me as I was moving into a new place. As we think together in the coming months about the call of your Pastor, I would ask you to consider the premise that there is no better way for a congregation to get to know a Pastor (or for the Pastor to get to know a congregation) than through sharing together in the study of scripture.



As we begin this third week of interim ministry together, there are a number of things happening around the church. The pre-

school teachers are returning and preparations are being made to welcome the students and begin a new program year. Rooms are being prepared and cleaned. For me, there is a wonderful sense of expectation that seems to be growing along with all the activity. On the church side,

I have begun to meet with your Ruling Elders to discuss with them the vision they have, as individuals, for the future of Broadmoor Presbyterian Church. To date, I have had one meeting with your Session and plans are being made for training events for Committees and the Session, as well as new opportunities for Bible studies, which I hope will be offered and begun in the next few weeks.

In the context this activity, I have been reflecting on something that I think is one of the most important things we can do in the church, which is to engage one another in the process of discerning God’s will for us and call to us, as individuals and as a Church Family. I hold a firm conviction that we are, each and every one of us, called by God to participate in the life and ministry of Jesus, who is our Lord and Christ. No one is left out of this call, since it is relational, and no one is unimportant. From youngest to oldest, richest to poorest, regardless of our condition or situation, we are, each one, called by God into the life that is shared in the fellowship of God’s Family, the Church.

In my experience, I find that most people don’t really understand that discerning one’s call is a relational process that involves the individual, God and one’s Church Family. I have experienced that we often associate God’s vocational call to us,

faith-based programming with re-

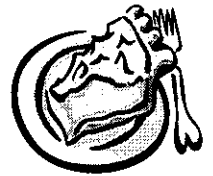
searched based, best clinical practices. Additional services include GED education and workforce development, which is incorporated as outlined by the individual care plan that each resident has.

Don't miss this great night of fellowship, fun and delicious desserts.

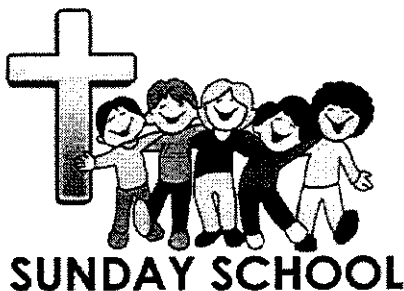


Children's Ministry News

with God’s call to life and ministry in the church. The classic example of this is the person, who is a teacher, who is asked to teach in the Sunday morning church school program, or moderate a Christian Education Committee, or both. I would suggest that most often one’s call to a vocation and one’s call to ministry within the church are quite different things.

I would suggest that God knows each of us quite well and does not call us to things that are not positive for us and, in the long run at least, are not a source of joy and contentment, which provides us a sense of peace and satisfaction. I would also suggest that as long as we live, God calls us to share in the LIFE of Christ, through our participation in the life and fellowship of the Church Family.

As we begin this interim time together, I want to invite you to consider the things you enjoy doing, those things that give you a reason to get up in the morning. I want to invite you to consider what your call from God might be in the context of your membership in this Church Family. In this context, I believe we must be willing to allow ourselves to think outside the box, because God’s call is most often, in my experience, a surprise to us. In my case, I was an atheist who was called by God to be a Pastor in the PCUSA. It was a surprise, not only to me, but too many of my friends, and especially family members!

I want to encourage you to consider all the things you enjoy in the context of your life and interests and how one, or several, of these

things may be an avenue for you to discern God’s call to you through the fellowship and family of Christ’s Church at Broadmoor Presbyterian. I would also encourage you to speak to someone within your church family about your sense of call to see if you can establish a confirmation of that call within the fellowship of Christ’s Church. Have someone talk, share and pray with you as part of a process of discerning God’s call to you in Christ.

I believe this is one of the most important reasons the church exists: to support, guide and direct each of us in our discernment of God’s call to us personally and corporately. As we begin this time of discernment for your Church Family, as your leaders seek God’s leading to a vision of the future ministry and mission you might share, I hope you will take the time to consider God’s call to you to be part of that future and the abundance of life that is found in that future and in God’s present call. I firmly believe you have a call. In order to discover your call, a process of discernment is required, according to Scripture. For this interim period, I am here to assist your Church Family, especially your Session, in a process of discernment for this family of faith. I am also here for you, if you would like to call me to support you in your own process of discerning God’s call. If I can be helpful to you in some way, I hope you will contact me at any time. Please call or email me. If I do not answer my phone, please leave a message and I will return your call, usually within 12 hours, almost certainly within 24.

I look forward to working with the leaders of this congregation to support their process of discernment of God’s call to your Church Family, to envision the future ministry of Broadmoor Presbyterian Church. I hope you will share in this process by engaging in your own, personal process to discerning how God is calling you to share in the life of your Church Family. I hope you will do this because you are important. I believe that when even one person within a Church Family does not hear and follow God’s call, the whole church (not just BPC, the church as a whole, which is the body of Christ) is diminished. If you share my sense that the world is a wonderful place, yet is also in something of a mess, I ask you to consider the life and ministry to which God is calling you. Because it may be that it will be YOUR ministry and God’s call to YOU that will make the biggest difference; one that just might change the world, or at least a local portion of it!

I hope to see you in worship this Sunday. Blessings & peace -

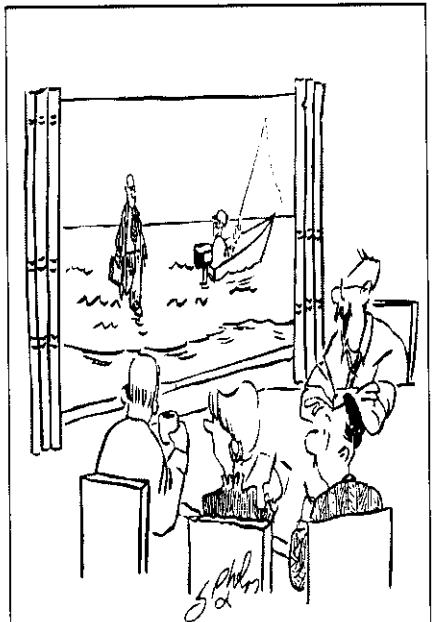

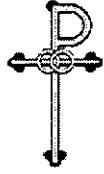

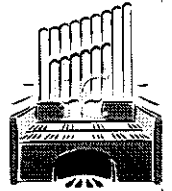
Join the Choir

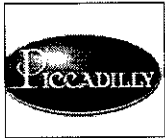

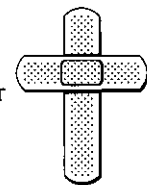
