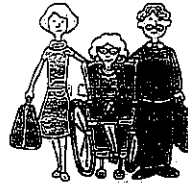

He never wanted to go into a nursing home, but when he had to, he really didn’t mind. He enjoyed all the folks there and made them smile. His friend, Rose, came every day and they both cheered up the entire home. They had been needed!

In a recent Guideposts, a daughter tells about leaving notes for the nursing home personnel, telling them about her mother’s special talents and life. The nurses were so interested. As they got to know her, she brought new interests into their lives.

We have all said “I hope I never have to move again.” God’s plan for us to help each other doesn’t usually pay any attention to that statement. He will put us where we are needed. And when He takes us home to Himself, it will be the biggest, most wonderful change of all.

Prayer: Dear Lord, Thank you for always being there for us, and for reassuring us when we need to make a change. Use us for Thy glory and guide us in our daily lives. If changes come, help us adjust easily. Amen.

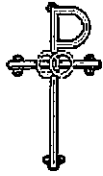

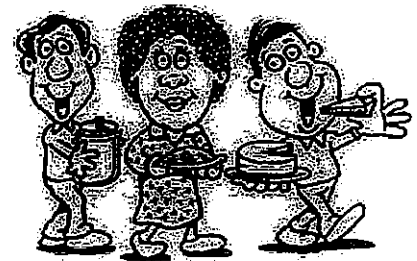

This month's Dutch Treat Sunday falls on February 8, 2015.

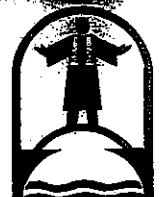

The Symbolism of Ashes

On the first day of Lent, pastors in many churches dip a finger in ashes (often made by burning palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday) and make a cross on parishioners' foreheads.



God's people have used ashes as a sign of mourning, humiliation and penitence. In the Old Testament, ashes were used as a purification offering. The New Testament speaks of repenting in "sackcloth and ashes" (Luke 10:13, NRSV).

On Ash Wednesday, Christians are painted because our sins—private and public—led to Jesus' death. With repentant hearts, we begin the season of Lent, knowing it leads to resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Give us harsh judgments—think kind thoughts.
Give up worry—trust God to provide.
Give up discouragement—be full of hope.
Give up bitterness—turn to forgiveness.
Give up hatred—return good for evil.
