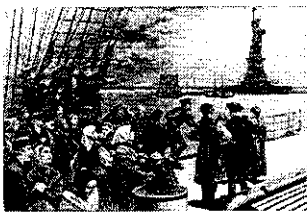


“What Were They Thinking?” by Pat Freshney

Our ancestors, who came to America, were so brave. All but the most prosperous knew they’d never see their parents, grandparents, and siblings again. I have one letter to my great grandmother from her cousin, who’d gone back to Ireland to visit. He said their grandfather had cried, realizing he’d never see her again.



As the immigrants stood at the rail on their

(small) sailing ships, **what** were they thinking? Many ships didn’t even land where they had planned. My Dad’s family, who came in 1819, had to work their way from Wattenberg, Germany, to Antwerp. Then they sailed, with eight children and another one on the way, and arrived in Savannah instead of Philadelphia. They already had relatives in America but had to trudge their way north to Pennsylvania, staying with relatives, and finally settling in upstate Pennsylvania. It must have taken a year just to “move.”

I’m glad to be an American. We are truly blessed. We owe a lot to those who made it possible. Those who came first left all be-

hind but brought their **faith**. They had no electricity, central air or heat, no modern appliances or prepared food, no communication except letters (**if** they could write.) They had to wash clothes (and themselves) in the creek, and cook over the fireplace. Sounds romantic, but it was actually hard work. They must have been in great physical condition, just from survival. Wouldn’t they laugh at our gyms and desire to “keep fit!”



Perhaps they had different or (stricter) ways to worship, but they passed their faith, their basic belief in God, on to us. It is up to us, all generations, to pass the love of God and His Son, Jesus, down to the next generation. God—Family—Country. Be glad to be an America, with freedom to pass our love of God on to others.

Psalm 89:1 I will sing of the love of the Lord forever. With my mouth, I will make your faithfulness known through all generations.

Points of Interest From the Session

Weekend Workers Rebuild Feliciana Retreat Cabins



Broadmoor Presbyterians were among the 15 volunteers who spent long weekends

for five months rebuilding two cabins at the Feliciana Retreat Center in Norwood. Dave Snyder, project coordinator, described the work that ran January through May: "We reused the materials that we could, but we had to replace both roofs entirely. The main achievement, and a very welcome one in this heat, is that we converted both cabins to air-conditioned cabins, and put in doors and windows, replacing screens.

"There is still much to be done before the cabins are complete. They need painting inside and out, and tile floors installed." "We're still recuperating from this round," he said. The rustic cabins are used in camping season, soon to end, with Traditional Family Property Camp that brings people from five countries besides the U.S.A., one of the two largest. The other largest is Camp Agape, held in June, sponsored by BPC. Each cabin sleeps eight. Ida Sharp, operations manager, noted that the camps are vital and volunteers treasured at the huge year-round operation encompassing 219 acres of pine and hard-

wood forest. "We had over 2,000 go through here last year for retreats, conferences, camps and activities for all ages. We have an air-conditioned center with dormitory-style rooms, that can sleep up to 170 guests, a dining hall, cottages and log cabin. This facility is open to anyone but reservations have to be made in advance and fees required. She and the Rev. Ted Roeling, moderator of the Council of Presbytery of South Louisiana, express extreme gratitude for the volunteers who spent long weeks on the cabins. "A labor of love, that lasted five months," they agreed.

Thoughts of celebrating the 4th evoke memories of reunions that were held on that day. When I was a teenager, my mother,

Spooney Sessions, and several of her friends started having a big-shared picnic at Connelly's Tavern on Ellicott Hill in Natchez. We would begin arriving near noon with all our belongings in preparation for the day. Each of the ladies thought they had to feed everyone who came so we always had more food than we could possibly eat. There were the large, juicy, red, home grown tomatoes still warm from the vine. The wonderful squash casserole that hardly tasted like squash because it contained so much melted cheese. The hand picked baby butterbeans and tender, just pulled ears of corn were abundant. The home fried chicken and thick slices of ham and roast beef topped off the main course. And then, to finish the meal off, there was a table groaning with cakes, cookies and pies to go along with the big freezer of home made fresh peach ice cream.

Because most of the Ladies hosting the picnic were Presbyterian, the current Presbyterian minister was always invited to the celebration. One year we

had an interim pastor, who, at that time, I thought was older than dirt but who was probably



younger than I presently am. He was asked to bless the food. He proceeded to give thanks for the food, the people, the picnic and I'm not real sure that he didn't eventually get around to blessing the chairs and the tables. Finally, a small voice, Betsy's, was heard, saying, "Mama, do we ever get to eat?" That brought the prayer to an abrupt end on a gust of laughter.

After we had semi-recovered from lunch, we'd wander out by the swimming pool to either watch or participate in the races. The shallow end of the pool was where the walk across was held for the little ones, who hadn't learned to swim. Older kids dove for pennies and raced up and down the pool. There were innumerable sore stomachs and bruised bottoms from the belly flop and the cannonball in the crazy diving contest. To finish the races up, a greased watermelon was thrown into the pool and the fellow, who got the watermelon out of the pool, got to share it with his friends. It was a wonder that no one was drowned trying to save the watermelon.

Over the years, as the young people moved away from home, we'd always try to get back for the Fourth. It was a time to renew acquaintances with old friends and catch up on the gossip. Unfortunately, too many of us wandered too far and the reunion has slowly died, but I'm sure that there are still many who remember the 4th of July picnic as one of the highlights of long gone summers.
